The March Monthly Meeting did not take place in the morning, as is customary, but in the afternoon, to accommodate some vital STEP negotiations of which more later. It was reported that the cleaning of site towels was in hand, and that if the books still missing from the DUA library were not returned forthwith, borrowing would be curtailed. The position of staff vacancies is dependent on the progress of STEP, but a Site Supervisor for Watling Court and an Assistant for Dr Armitage (Caroline has now gone Down Under) are to be advertised for. If either of these posts go to present members of the contracted staff, then presumably their former positions will also need to be filled. Work on the projected Cripplegate Wall Scheme —although distinct from the DUA's rescue programshould also provide some employment in the future.

Officers Reports were then given. Tony has completed his work on Trig Lane, and has turned his attention to Aldermanbury and the Cripplegate Fort. Site work continues, and is reported elsewhere. The publication of Davy Jones' Triangle site seems to have found a problem or two, and a plague of vicious flies was complained of. Chris Green represented us at the Association of Archaeological Illustraters & Surveyors, we spent a 4 figure sum on equipment to locate trace elements, and JAS was accused of grinning superciliously: he denied the accusation, and the CUA forgave him. The incident in question was the result of a volunteer whose services on site were refused— a non too diplomatic gesture. Brian hoped that such incidents would be avoided in future, as volunteer help is essential to our work program

The problems of our public image were aired further, with talk of site notice boards for every site, however short-term, as a matter of course: no site in the public eye should be without an up to date information board. The GPO leaflets were being prepared for the press, and the DUA is to take part in a series of Lunchtime Lectures on Current Archaeology in the Museum on Fridays, from 12th May to July.

Wendy Evans, who described St. Nicholas excavation as a bombsite, asked for DUA contributions for the Observers 'Up Front' spot, L.B.C's Tuesday session, and other articles for the popular press. Phillip's horn cores and the site vacuum cleaner were then suggested as possible topics.



The Oman "Central Unit" numbers just three at present Beatrice de Cardi our Rob and one other. Up-country Oman is one of the last outposts of Empire both the local army commander and police chief are British and the latter is keen on archaeology. On request he issued a proclamation threatening stone-robbers with two weeks in jail. The diggers have also been introduced to the local Wali, a kind of Arab J.P., and to his I5 armed feudal retainers complete with rifles and bandoliers. They are less impressive than they look though as none of the ammunition fits the rifles.


Efforts will be made to get a copy of the film and have a DUA Film Show. KF.

BOOK COVER

British urban archaeologists are just beginning to see the fruits of their frenzied efforts to rescue history from the ravages of post-war redevelopment. Volumes I & II of 'Excavations in Medieval Southampton' "...set the standard against which later works will be measured ... ", as Dr Helen Clarks said in her recent review. The next work of that genre is in fact her own "EXCAVATIONS IN KING'S LYNN, 1963- 1970" (with Alan Carter).

Its a 480 page Med. Archaeol. Monograph, containing excavation details finds reports from 16 sites, rounded off with an especially useful Discussion and Conclusions chapter. The modifications of King's Lynn's waterfront and its role as a port are themes which feature prominently in this important work, making it a vital parallel for London, while the extensive Finds Catalogue and the notes on everything from brickwork to horn cores should make it compulsive reading for all members of the DUA.

Not as sumptuous as the Soton vols., but, at £10, only $\frac{1}{3}$ of the price! A jolly good read, containing much of great interest: for example, with regard to the many leather shoes, belts and scabbards found, it is reported that "...the bulk of the material came from Marks & Spencer...". (p. 349).
